CAPITAL OF SCULPTURE

The Wakefield district has a deep-seated dedication to art and sculpture. The birthplace of acclaimed artists Henry Moore and Barbara Hepworth, art is in the district's lifeblood. Wakefield is the only place outside London to host two Art Fund Museum of the Year Award-winning galleries.

The first of these is **The Hepworth Wakefield**,
a stunning David
Chipperfield-designed
building on the city's
waterfront. It houses an
impressive compendium
of modern British and
international art, with
a varied programme of
temporary exhibitions
and permanent displays.

The second, a short journey from the city centre, is the **Yorkshire Sculpture Park**. The park hosts an exciting, ever-changing selection of contemporary and 20th century sculptural works in more than 500 acres of landscaped parkland. The rolling

countryside also provides a backdrop to a sizeable permanent collection, including pieces by both Henry Moore and Barbara Hepworth.

Back in the heart of the city, **The Art House** is a hive of creative activity. The "house that art built" is a small but mighty hub for emerging and established artists to exhibit their work, and for audiences to engage with the creative process. Look out for workshops, open studio days, artist talks and lots more.

A five-minute walk away, **Neon Workshops** showcases the quirky, esoteric art form of neon sculpture through a programme of vibrant exhibitions.

At all the artistic venues in the Wakefield district, there's a strong focus on getting involved, so watch out for workshops and craft sessions designed for all skill levels to help you get those creative juices flowing!





TAKE A WALK ON THE ART SIDE

Have you discovered Artwalk Wakefield? This loveletter to visual arts occurs every other month, and is an evening of art, performance, music, heritage and socialising, held in a series of quirky, independent venues across Wakefield city centre. From prints in a pub to gardening in a gallery, you never know quite what to expect - except the unexpected!

Previous Artwalks have included major exhibition launches by international artists alongside local film festivals, guided historical tours, a homage to Bob Ross for a paint-a-long (in a cocktail bar!) and an interactive parody of 90's favourite Neil Buchanan's Big Art Attack.

FROM ROMANS TO RHUBARB

Wakefield's heritage goes back thousands of years. Explore the heroes, villains, rulers and ordinary people who've helped to shape its extraordinary stories.

A former working mine,

Dating from the early 14th century,
Wakefield Cathedral
has witnessed many of these. The owner of Yorkshire's tallest spire, the cathedral also boasts soaring Victorian architecture, beautiful mediaeval features (including the intricately carved rood screen and blue quire ceiling), and a quiet peace in the heart of the bustling city.

Nearby, its tiny neighbour, charming **Chantry Chapel**, is the oldest and most ornate of England's surviving bridge chapels.

Delve into the country's mining heritage at the National Coal Mining Museum.

the museum features more than a dozen galleries, interactive displays, living history interpretation, and more. An absolute must-do is an Underground Tour. led by former miners. From the salt of the earth to the lords of the manor. National Trust **Nostell** is one of the north's great treasure houses. This Palladian mansion, the work of Robert Adam, contains opulent wonders, including its collection of Chippendale furniture, uniquely residing in the

home for which it was

designed.







WAKEFIELD MUSEUMS AND CASTLES

Wakefield Museums and Castles tell the story of Wakefield, its people, and their impact on the world, through a group of three museums and two castles.

From the Roman Legions to Rugby League, **Castleford Museum** is a treasure-trove of stories. Kids will love the chance to dress up as a Roman legionnaire and handle ancient objects.

Once known as the Key to the North, **Pontefract Castle** is a space for family fun, with intriguing ruins to explore. See if you've got what it takes to be a Civil Wars soldier! See the country's first secret ballot box, marvel at the glittering beauty of the **Ackworth Hoard**, and try out liquorice-themed soft play at **Pontefract Museum**.

The site of the Battle of Wakefield (and mentioned in Shakespeare's Henry VI, Part 2) **Sandal Castle**'s romantic ruins provide a picturesque backdrop to views across the Calder Valley. **Wakefield Museum** is a multi-sensory experience - use an iron age quern, hear rhubarb growing, make yourself cosy in the front room and lots more!

Wakefield Museums and Castles offer a year-round programme of exciting events, workshops, talks and tours. Visit **Experience Wakefield** for details.

SHOWTIME!

When people think of Wakefield's creativity, they probably call to mind mid-century sculpture or bold modern art. But the district's artistry isn't just visual, it's audible, too, with festivals, gigs and concerts taking place all across the district.

Best known is **Long Division**, an awardwinning festival
showcasing emerging
grassroots artists and
legends of Indie and DIY,
Long Division's previous
headliners have included
The Cribs, Billy Bragg,
British Sea Power,

The Fall, Ash and more. Less-known but no less eclectic, the annual **Clarence Park Festival** is Yorkshire's longestrunning free music festival, covering all genres.

Proms at the Castle is an evening of stirring classical music in the atmospheric surroundings of **Pontefract Castle**, with a spectacular fireworks finish.

Friarwood Festival
in Pontefract keeps
the good times going,
presenting the best
local bands and artists
alongside fringe activity.
Roaming festival Yonder
features outdoor DJ
sets and indoor live acts
alongside its artisan
stalls and street-food
vendors.

It's not just festivals, though. There are scores of smaller gigs and concerts everywhere you look. **Bodys** and **Philophobia Music** programme 2-band lineups of exciting emerging artists from the district and beyond in unusual spaces across the city.

Wakefield Jazz hosts "West Yorkshire's favourite Friday night", featuring the best British, European and American jazz musicians.



Meanwhile **Venue 23** provides a permanent home for a variety of live music acts, including a plethora of tribute bands and theme nights.

Experience the soaring acoustics of **Wakefield Cathedral** with weekly, free lunchtime concerts.

Of course, music's not the only performance you'll find in the district: **Theatre Royal Wakefield** has every genre you could possibly want, and more, with creative director John Godber overseeing a packed schedule of comedy, drama, musicals and more. Find out more at





Quirky is a Wakefield speciality, and why should cinema be different? **Catacomb Cinee** at **Westgate Unitarian Chapel** is a unique experience. Where else can you see classic black and white films in a mysterious, eerie crypt? Let's hope the catacomb "residents" are film lovers...













MAKE SOME MEMORIES

We'll be honest, we're in Yorkshire, the sun doesn't always shine, and the weather could be described as changeable to say the least, but that doesn't stop the fun!

Wakefield has a multitude of exciting, action-packed, and inspiring experiences for families, regardless of the weather!

Plan a fun-fuelled day out at Xscape Yorkshire: test out your skill, nerve and reflexes on the new e-karts, bounce your way around **Gravity**, sledge down the real snow ski slope or take in the view from the 70ft high skycoaster. With all this and more, you may need to stay for a while! Get kitted out with a miner's helmet and lamp and take the cage down 140m into the dark

depths of the mine at the

National Coal Mining Museum. There's also loads more to explore above ground, including a nature trail, adventure playground and the handsome resident pit ponies.

From one type of digging to another... have you ever fancied having a go at driving a real digger? We have just the place. **Diggerland** has 20 themed rides and drives, providing plenty of fun for kids (and big kids too!).

Speaking of rides, **Pugneys Light Railway** is a 7¼" gauge, passenger-carrying miniature railway.



providing train rides for all the family, located in **Pugneys Country Park.** All aboard!

For outdoor fun, discover the Room on the Broom Trail at Anglers Country Park. Follow the clues around the lake to find Witch, Cat and other characters from the well-loved children's book by Julia Donaldson.

March to the top of the keep at Sandal Castle, explore the dark dungeons at Pontefract Castle or play as you learn at the district's

Farmer Copleys, in Pontefract, is a farm shop where you can do a whole week's shopping in one place. With an excellent vegetable stall and fantastic butchery, see if you can put off being tempted by their amazing pies and craft beers.

One of the first farm shops in the district, Wakefield's **Blacker Hall Farm** prides itself on the fact that more than 75% of everything sold in the shop is produced and prepared on-site, especially their famous award-winning beef products.

If you're looking for a good, honest down-to-earth farm shop with no frills, Castleford's **Methley Bridge Farm Shop** is the one! The shop isn't huge, but it has everything you need - meat, seasonal vegetables, bread, dairy, fruit and preserves.

It doesn't get more Yorkshire than rhubarb, and John Edward Dobson, owner of the Carlton-based **Rhubarb Triangle Farm Shop**, was one of the first to develop the Yorkshire forced rhubarb technology.



In addition to being rhubarb pioneers, the Rhubarb Triangle Farm Shop sells a wide variety of local farm produce and boasts a tasty delicatessen counter.

In Pontefract. visit picture-perfect **Blondies**. delectable DJs or the Castle Coffee Shop at Pontefract Castle. while over in Ossett and Horbury you can globetrot to Greece

with **Olympus Bakery** & **Café** or Scandinavia with **Øl**.

Wakefield lives up to its nickname the "Merrie City" with a fantastic range of cosy pubs and quirky bars. Real ale lovers will be in heaven at Ossett Brewery's The Hop or The Kings Arms, while **The Junction** and the **Bradlev Arms** serve up pints from more of the district's breweries, such as Five Towns Breweries and **Revolutions Brewing** Company.

For cocktails and good vibes check out RBT Video - a speakeasy designed as an 80s video store. More top cocktail venues include The Mad Ox, Supper Club and The Golden Pineapple.

More and more people are switching to a vegetarian or fully vegan diet. Whether you're looking to get healthy, help the planet or you're a big-time animal lover, Wakefield has a whole bunch (pardon the pun) of plant-based restaurants and cafés for you to choose from.

Wakefield city centre restaurant **Corarima** is a great place to start. Their menu is naturally vegan-friendly so you won't find plant-based substitutes, or vegan alternatives - here, plant-based is the delicious, moreish star of the show. Oh, and it's also gluten free, too!

Throwback Coffee House Wakefield city centre, is something of a misnomer, they're actually more of a throw-forward: featuring



a super-cool interior (inspired by tattoo artists, plants and all-round good vibes), a menu full of vegan treats, and ethically sourced coffee (and oat milk, of course), it's a trailblazer, and the perfect spot for those of a plant-based persuasion.

Those with a sweet tooth will love **Doboy Donuts**. With branches in Wakefield and Castleford, Doboy has a menu full of huge, extraspecial donuts packed full of flavour, topped with all manner of delights, baked fresh 7 days a week - and proud to be vegan friendly!

With seasonal variations and special creations appearing on the menu throughout the year, there's a gooey, indulgent treat for everyone.

Like Doboy, **Ego** has a couple of venues in the Wakefield district: **Ego** at The Bull's Head in Horbury, and **Ego** at The Beverley Arms in Ackworth. Both boast menus packed full of delightful dishes from





around the Mediterranean
- including French,
Spanish, Italian, Greek
and Moroccan food and have a dedicated
vegan menu, so you can
indulge in fine dining,
quilt-free.

Located in the heart of Wakefield city centre, **Tết** is a chic, stylish East Asian restaurant featuring slick, modern decor and serving delicious Vietnamese and Thai food. They have a dedicated vegan menu with classic staples and seasonal delicacies, including tom yum mushroom, tofu panang curry, and sweet corn cake.

Looking for adventure? Wakefield is the ideal destination, whether you're watching from the sidelines or right in the heart of the action.

The Wakefield district is known for its rugby league heritage, and fans will love the authentic atmosphere as they cheer on local Super League rivals Castleford Tigers and Wakefield Trinity, and the Championship's Featherstone Rovers.

One of the district's must-do sporting experiences is a day at Pontefract Racecourse, Europe's longest continuous flat racing circuit. Even casual racegoers will love the season's many theme days, including Flat Cap and Whippet Day (celebrate everything Yorkshire!) and the iconic Ladies Day (posh frocks at the ready!).

If you'd rather participate than spectate, there are ample opportunities. Wakefield's got some great golf courses for you to practise your swing, including the City of Wakefield Golf Club, an 18-hole, par 72 course set in undulating mature parkland.

In Pontefract, Aspire
(a) the Park offers a
Climbing Zone, 4G
football pitch, 10-lane
swimming pool, and
bike hire. Other stateof-the-art leisure
facilities can be found
at Featherstone Sports
Complex and Thornes
Park Stadium.

Burn up the track at Wakefield Indoor Karting, featuring one

of the most challenging tarmac circuits in the country. Don't get caught out on the hairpin bends!



Yorkshire Tactical Activities is a woodland paintball, airsoft and laser tag venue with 100 acres over multiple game zones so you and your friends can battle it out across tanks, castles, villages and more.

Taking the fear factor up a notch, **Yorkshire Scare Grounds** is a seasonal thrill you won't want to miss. When Halloween comes around, the scream-park invites thrill-seekers into terrifying haunted houses, scare mazes and scare zones, with horrifying roaming characters and lots more!

For a truly retro experience, pull on your skates and roll on down to **Fusion Skating**. Try out a beginner's class until you find your feet and feel ready to join in regular open skate sessions.

THE CALL OF THE WILD

The Wakefield district is 70% rural. Whether you're looking for cosy pastoral fields, the sun-dappled sparkle of lakes and waterways, the splendour of ancient country estates or the sacred hush of wild woodland, you'll find it here.

The district has a large number of country parks, in many cases the result of postindustrial rewilding. **Pugneys Country Park** is one such. The site of a former opencast mine. little visitors will adore the Blown Away adventure trail, zipline, adventure playground and more, while walkers can take their time as they loop round the park's two lakes - the smaller is a designated nature reserve - then head up the hill to explore the ruins of Sandal Castle.

Historic Anglers
Country Park is the site of the world's first nature reserve, and is still a fantastic space for wildlife watching as you make your way through the park. Anglers is conveniently located next to the magnificent

Haw Park Woods and Wintersett Reservoir (the location of the West Riding Sailing Club).

The serenity of
Newmillerdam Country
Park features a magical
lakeside path and
woodland. Take in a
variety of bird species
and the serenity of the
Arboretum. The Gnome
Roam gives children
something to focus
on during a trip, and a
walk is not complete
without stopping at The
Boathouse for locallysourced treats.

From coalface to wild place, RSPB Fairburn Ings is a sanctuary for birds and animal life of all kinds, with such diverse habitats as open water, wet grasslands, deciduous woodlands and lagoons providing a haven of peace and tranquillity for some of the UK's rarest birds.



ACTIVE ADVENTURE

There are some wonderful walks and cycling trails in Wakefield. The **Wakefield Way** is a 70-mile rural ramble around the district's boundary, taking in hidden gems as well as Wakefield's best-known spots.

The **Wakefield Wheel** is a circular cycling route through quaint villages, pretty towns and stunning open countryside.

The **Transpennine Trail** takes visitors through some of the area's most beautiful landscapes, and either walking or cycling this route is a great way to immerse yourself in the glories of the natural world.

If you'd prefer urban exploration, **The Art House**'s cycle stations invite you to "cycle to culture", while the city of Wakefield itself is full of walking trails pointing out some of the area's special sites and hidden histories.

DID YOU KNOW?

Anglers Country
Park, the world's first
nature reserve, was
created in the 1800s
by pioneering Victorian
eco-warrior Charles
Waterton.

A local landowner, and inhabitant of nearby Walton Hall (now a world-class hotel), Waterton was passionate about wildlife and the need for conservation. He built a wall 9-feet high and more than 3 miles long, around his estate to keep out poachers (and the local fox population).

Furnishing the wildlife in his haven with various proto-nesting boxes and birdhouses, he even set up dummy-birds to fool any poachers who did manage to sneak into the park, and hides so he could record the species that made their home there.

Over 30 years, he recorded well over a hundred species of birds in Walton Hall Park.



EXPLORE CASTLEFORD

The birthplace of artists Henry Moore and Albert Wainwright; a place with a proud rugby heritage and a history going back to the Iron Age, the market town of Castleford is a hive of activity.

The site of a Roman settlement. Castleford has seen more history than most. Uncover the town's unique history in Castleford Museum. See an ancient Iron Age Chariot, learn about what life was like in Roman Lagentium and relive days gone by in the photography of Jack Hulme. Don't miss the beautiful Henry Moore sculpture in the library on the floor below! Shoppers will love Castleford's indoor and outdoor markets. Browse the colourful stalls and pick up anything and everything from the finest freshly caught fish to clothes,

books, games and lots more. Or pop into Carlton Lanes Shopping Centre for high street names, then treat yourself to a delicious pick-me-up in one of the town's independent eateries and tearooms.

Standing proudly on


Standing proudly on the banks of the river Aire, **Queen's Mill** is the world's largest stone grinding flour mill, with twenty pairs of stones. The site has housed a working mill since Roman times, and flour has been produced here for an almost unbroken period of more than 900 years. Although it still produces its own flour, these days Queen's Mill is home to Queen's Mill Tea Rooms, local coffee roasters Recent Beans, Yorkshire Craft Beers, Riverside Paint a Pot and artists studios, as well as hosting theatre, concerts, craft markets and more throughout the year.





THE HOME OF RUGBY

The hugely popular sport of rugby league was born and bred in West Yorkshire, originating here in 1895. Since that time, the game has spread all over the world, and is now played and watched globally. Its heritage, however, remains deeply rooted in the district, with the very first Castleford club - aptly named Castleford RFC - joining the league in 1896. The town's more famous team, Castleford Tigers, was established in 1926, with "Classy Cas" delighting fans and devastating foes for almost a century since. Nowadays, the Tigers are known up and down the country and enjoy a close rivalry with neighbours Featherstone Rovers and Wakefield Trinity.



DON'T MISS!

1. Junction 32 Yorkshire Shopping Outlet

With nearly 100 brands to choose from, you'll be spoilt for choice when you indulge in some bargain hunting at this superb outlet village.

2. Xscape Yorkshire

Just across the road from Junction 32 is the ultimate fun-fuelled destination offering skiing, climbing, adventure golf, cinema and loads more.

3. Diggerland

Drive and operate real diggers, dumpers and other full- size construction machinery across 20 different rides and drives.

4. RSPB Fairburn Ings

Get closer to nature in this lush green nature reserve, which offers an exciting place for families to create their own wildlife adventures.

HISTORIC PONTEFRACT

With heritage galore, history buffs will be beguiled as you explore this classic West Yorkshire market town's Georgian streets and ancient ginnels, cute cafes, captivating castle and lots more.

A true hidden gem, the picturesque market town of Pontefract is home to the imposing ruins of Pontefract Castle. With spectacular views and fascinating dungeons to investigate, it's an adventure not to be missed. Only a short walk away you'll find the historic marketplace. Fine examples of Georgian architecture obscure a network of mediaeval ainnels with the odd burst of street art thrown into the mix.

To uncover more of the town's long and turbulent history visit the beautifully curated **Pontefract Museum**, set in a charming art nouveau building, which offers intriguing exhibitions and family activities.

The town has a vibrant market and a whole

host of independent boutiques, quaint tearooms and cosy coffee shops. Don't miss out on a bit of antiquing at the Magistrates Market (and pop upstairs to Forever After Collective to pick up a handcrafted treasure!) and end the day unwinding with a quality local brew in one of the town's many quirky pubs, thanks to Pontefract's emerging real ale and craft beer scene.

If you need a break from the hustle and bustle, take a stroll through the green spaces of Friarwood Valley Gardens or visit Pontefract Park and its neighbours Aspire @ the Park and Pontefract Racecourse.



THE KEY TO THE NORTH

From its construction in 1070 to its demise following the Civil Wars, the once-fearsome fortress of **Pontefract Castle** dominated Yorkshire and beyond, bearing witness to some of England's most momentous historical events earning itself the name of the Key to the North!

Today, the castle is a place of family-friendly adventure, with wide open spaces to explore and play, and fascinating ruins to investigate. Climb to the top of the keep and see the surrounding Yorkshire countryside, and visit the castle gift shop for a colourful range of souvenirs, gifts, books and ice creams.



ALLSORTS OF FUN

Pontefract's historic link with liquorice dates back to the Middle Ages. Sap extracted from the roots of the plant was used medicinally by monks until George Dunhill, a Pontefract apothecary, added sugar to the recipe and produced the first 'Pomfret Cakes' sweets in 1760.

Today, Pontefract is still home to world-renowned confectionery brand Haribo and "Pontefract Cakes" can be bought at **Pontefract Castle** (still stamped with a stylised replica of the castle, as is tradition).

The town is so fond of liquorice that it hosts Pontefract Liquorice Festival every July, with Liquorice Shoots celebrations for the locals.

24 HOURS IN WAKEFIELD

Go on a whistle-stop tour of Wakefield, as we show you how to get the most out of a day in the city!

MORNING

The best way to get your bearings is to look up: there you'll see the 247-foot spire of **Wakefield Cathedral** (the tallest in Yorkshire!). Located in the heart of the city, it's an excellent base to help you find your way around.

From there, make your way through the Civic Quarter, taking in its beautiful architecture, and head to The Art House, a creative space for artists and makers with a programme of inspiring exhibitions, courses and workshops.

A short walk away is Wakefield Museum: discover a wealth of local treasures and learn surprising facts about the city.

AFTERNOON

Your next stop is **The Hepworth Wakefield**,
an award-winning art
gallery on the city's
historic waterfront.
While you're there, take
a moment to immerse
yourself in the beautiful
garden, a tranquil space
combining sculpture
with nature. A few yards
away you'll find **Tileyard North**, a creative
industries hub.

Looking for some retail therapy instead? With two shopping centres, The Ridings and Trinity Walk, and a huge array of independent shops, - to choose from, selling anything from vinyl and handcrafted gifts to blankets and skateboards. Don't

forget your wallet!

EVENING

Theatre Royal Wakefield offers a great night out - with a full programme of something for everyone, you're sure to find a performance to suit your taste. If you're more in the mood for a cocktail or a real ale to top off your busy day, the city has an eclectic mix of bars and pubs offering space to kick back and relax, or dance the night away to live music.





DID YOU KNOW?

1. The home of neon... Established in 2010 by artist Richard William Wheater, Neon Workshops specialises in the development and manufacturing of neon lighting. The Wakefield-based facilities are home to a gallery and public resource library, while visitors can also book onto neonmaking courses and workshops.

GETTING HERE AND AROUND

The Wakefield district is ideally located at the heart of West Yorkshire and is easily accessible by all methods of transport.

Wakefield is situated at the crossroads of the M1 and M62 and the A1/M1 link road, and is only 10 minutes from Leeds and 2 hours from London by train. The city is a 40-minute drive from Leeds Bradford Airport, and just over an hour from Manchester Airport.

Wakefield is also within striking distance of other major tourism destinations in the area, including the cities of Leeds, Bradford, Sheffield, and even York, as well as within easy reach of the Pennines, Peak District. Yorkshire

Dales and Yorkshire Moors - making it the ideal base for a longer stay to explore the region.

Wakefield is easy to get to and it's even easier to navigate once you're here.

Wakefield city is served by two train stations, Westgate and Kirkgate, with regular train services from London Kings Cross, Leeds, Sheffield, Doncaster and Manchester.
